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Visit to the Royal Courts of Justice

On 9th June a group led by Joan Somerset travelled by train to London to visit the Royal Courts of Justice. Outside Charing Cross we boarded Routemaster bus number 11 which took us along The Strand to the building's entrance.

The Royal Courts of Justice is an impressive structure. It was built on a 7½ acre site occupied by the Kit Kat Club and 450 houses containing 4,175 people; in two houses alone in Robin Hood Court, 52 people had had their abode. Designed by George Edmund Street, it was opened by Queen Victoria in 1882 and became the permanent home of the Supreme Court. The building was required to replace a number of separate courts that had come into existence over time to meet different needs; these were reconstituted by the Judicature Acts of 1873–75 which also addressed the many anomalies and archaisms that had arisen in British law during the preceding centuries. The interior of the building is no less impressive than the exterior with a high, church-like hall 238 feet long. Our guide led us to one of the older, original oak-panelled courtrooms where he informed us that each court has an interior unique unto itself because each was designed by a different architect. We were later taken to an area called the “Bear Garden” (a noisy place where Masters deal with applications to settle certain matters before trial), and later to a display of manikins bedecked with historical wigs and gowns.

Anybody is allowed to enter the building and observe what goes on in the 88 court rooms – but be prepared to experience security procedures similar to those found at airports.

For our June outing we went to the Bough Beech Reservoir – it was a glorious hot sunny day! Swallows and blue tits had nests in the barn and both were very busy feeding their young and, whilst we were having our lunch, they were skimming over our heads. We also saw some sparrows nesting, jackdaws fighting crows, a cuckoo singing, crested grebes and mallards with babies, wagtails – both the grey and pied – and a cormorant in a tree with his wings open (which was quite an awesome sight). Around the reservoir there were also nesting swans, many herons, tufted ducks, greylag geese, moorhens, coots, house martins, a buzzard circling overhead, swifts, one ringed plover – a very pretty wader – and a common tern diving for fish; this gains considerable height and then dives very fast and skims the water. All in all it was a most enjoyable day.

Visit to Metropolitan Police Museum, West Brompton, on 9th June 2010.

Thirteen members, together with one visitor from Australia, enjoyed visiting this collection of Metropolitan memorabilia covering 180 years of the London police service. The area of the museum is small, and, therefore, the collection on display at any one time is restricted; it simply represents the vast number of items held in store. Our visit was greatly enhanced by the curator who guided us around the museum. On show was a selection of uniforms and equipment, including examples of the outfits worn by women police officers that celebrated ninety years of this branch of the service. Also available is a family history facility for past serving members of the Metropolitan Police.

Derusti Oylkhan

(Another extract from Ian Brydon's History of Western Music)

Like many Eastern European composers of his generation, Oylkhan was an avid collector of folk music, if only because the authorities were favourably disposed towards "the music of the proletariat". An incredibly self-centred man, he was soon discarded by his fellow composers who abandoned him on the Bakdor Steppes in the middle of a collecting tour, when he insisted that he had himself discovered, and was indeed on the point of publishing, every new piece of folk music that they had found, even in the most remote parts of Siberia. Having fallen out with them (all were later purged when Oylkhan became Regional Controller of Ideologically Correct Music for the Province of Ullotosh), he fell in with a party of touring nomads whose melodies he used in his drama "Karma – the Tale of a Lama". The aria "Hold My Horse, I'm a Stranger in Paradise" made Oylkhan a household word. That word was later expunged from the approved dictionaries of the State. It seemed impossible that so egotistical a man would ever marry, but he did so when the Party decreed that the married state was desirable for all who aspired to public office. It was, perhaps, illustrative of his inward looking nature that he composed a piano duet for himself and his wife to perform when the Country's leading politicians visited the Province, not realising that his wife could not read music or play any instrument. He fell from grace when the Party's Invigilator of Artists, Writers and Lesser Intellectuals detected a sequence of three notes in his ballet "An Armenian in Paris" which appeared to be copied from Gershwin's popular but politically incorrectly coloured "Rhapsody in Blue". Born in Shaim in Eastern Siberia, Oylkhan died in Zerwool. His headstone bears the inscription "Veneeveedeeveechee", the meaning of which has puzzled the few scholars who could be bothered with him, though one has claimed, unconvincingly, that it was the name of his first troika.
