Our May visit was to Winston Churchill's "Britain at War Experience" in Tooley Street. This proved to be a most interesting and authentic exhibition, and, for those of us who were children during the war years, it brought back memories – not always pleasant – of what life was like with the constant bombing during the blitz and, later, with the V1s and V2s. It was quite nostalgic to see the shops with prices in pounds, shillings and pence, and to see how people coped with food and clothing rationing. It was a very worthwhile visit and a good source of education for primary school children to learn what life was like for their grandparents between 1939 and 1945.

Ron Carpenter began his programme with Verdi's "The Force of Destiny Overture" played by The Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, followed by Allegri's "Miserere" by the Thomas Tallis Scholars, which was beautiful. We then heard Schubert's String Quartet in C major by the Emerson String Quartet, with Mstislav Rostropovich on the cello. We then heard Concerto de Aranjuez by Rodrigo, which was played by The Brighouse & Rastrick Brass Band; this is a staple for both Brass Bands and solo guitar. We then had "Le Onde" {the wave} written and performed by Ludovico Einaudi on the piano, followed by the conclusion of Bolero by Ravel played by the London Symphony Orchestra and conducted by André Previn; no doubt we all remember Torvill & Dean for their accomplishments on the ice rink during this piece. Before we had our break, we heard Pablo de Sarasate's "Zigeunerweisen" {gypsy airs} by the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra conducted by Andrew Litton, and accompanied by the outstanding violinist, Joshua Bell, playing with great verve. We began the last part of the programme with the ever popular "Warsaw Concerto", written by Richard Addinsell for the film "Dangerous Moonlight"; this was played by the Royal Ballet Sinfonia conducted by Kenneth Alwyn. We concluded with Chopin's Piano Concerto № 1 in E minor played by The Royal Philharmonic Orchestra. This afternoon of music lived up to our aim for an interesting mix of music.

Ballet Buffet

(An extract from Ian Brydon's History of Western Music)

The collaboration of Hugo Rincenspitte and Walter Walle-Karpeting in the short lived phenomenon of promenade ballet has faded into obscurity. The success of Sir Henry Wood's Promenade Concerts had aroused envy on the Continent, and the two struggling proprietors of a Prussian theatre thought that they could enlarge on the idea, and enrich themselves by combining the concepts of the tea dance and the symphony orchestra. While refined classical ballets were performed on a sunken circular stage, concert-goers were able to wander around its circumference and watch the gyrations of the dancers below. They were served refreshments by waitresses recruited from the steadier members of the corps de ballet who pirouetted through the throng with trays of cordials and pastries at prices so high that they almost reached the cost of the uninformative programmes for which all theatres are justly famed. The introduction of cream cakes led to the downfall of the theatre (and the dancers), coinciding as it did with the inclusion of custard pie throwing in the films of that era. The opportunity to emulate the Kinematic heroes of the age proved to be too strong for the student element of the audience, many of whom queued all night outside bakeries hoping for returns. And so another chapter in the history of music came to a close. Entrepreneurs in England who had observed the early success of Ballet Buffet, and had thought to emulate it by investing heavily in theatres and eel and pie shops, sold out, and precipitated the Great Alimentary Depression from which English food has never quite recovered. The later incursion of oriental foods led to the revival of the garlic tongue in North Britain, but that is another story.
